## FREDERICK CHAPMAN ROBBINS

Frederick Chapman Robbins is known as an outstanding research scientist in the field of medicine and as an innovative leader in medical education. Born in Auburn, Alabama, he was educated at the University of Missouri and at Harvard University. In early career he held important research positions in the National Research Council and at the Children's Hospital in Boston. He became Director of the Department of Pediatrics and Contagious Diseases in the Cleveland Metropolitan General Hospital in 1952, as well as Professor of Pediatrics at Case-Western Reserve University. He was made Dean of the School of Medicine there in 1966.

Dr. Robbins' excellent work in the application of tissue culture methods to the study of viral infections caused him to be named co-recipient of the Nobel Prize in Physiology and Medicine in 1954. He has received numerous other honors. He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the National Academy of Sciences, and of several important medical associations.

Dr. Robbins continues his work as Senior Scholar in Residence at the National Academy of Sciences, Institute of Medicine. Untold thousands of persons all over the world have benefited from the brilliant research and inspired leadership. This University, with this degree, now recognizes his superb work in many areas.
